This Special Issue aims to contribute to our understanding of determinants of recovery for people with schizophrenia and related disorders, including those with other serious mental illnesses, as well as determinants of prevention or recovery for those considered to be at-risk. We define recovery broadly to include both objective indicators and subjective indicators. We welcome submissions to this Special Issue that expand our knowledge of determinants of recovery through empirical, theoretical, or systematic review/meta-analytic approaches. Contributions examining a variety of determinants, including such potential areas as neurocognition, metacognition, sociodemographic and background factors, illness- or symptom-related factors, social cognition, or other social factors are encouraged. Treatment studies with recovery-oriented outcomes are also welcome, but submissions are not limited to those reporting on intervention work.
