Automation	Use when orgs describe an automatic process by which comments are moderated	
Case-by-Case Comment Allowance	Use when orgs describe some comments as permissible	
Human moderation and or moderation teams	Use when human moderation is described in any way (cross coding ok)	
Outsourcing of Comment Moderation	Use when outsourcing is described	i.e. social media
Selective Comment Activation	Use when orgs describe how/why they choose which articles on which to allow commenting	
Connection or Community Building	Use when orgs reference the idea that commenting or interaction with readers builds community	
Effects or Expected Outcome of Comment Removal	When orgs describe the expected outcome of their decisions regarding commenting; Parent node; code to sub nodes when applicable	
Comments or Discussions Hosted Elsewhere		i.e. social media
Effects of Incivility in Comments	When orgs describe consequences of bad commenting	i.e. journalists' mental health, misinformation, community discord, etc.
Importance and or Primacy of Conversation	The desire to continue commenting in a civil way	
Possibility of Temporary Removal	When orgs describe leaving the door open to hosting comments in the future or reversing their current decision
