Social relationships and early life histories play an important role in the physical and psychological wellbeing of many animal species. The close relationships some humans form with companion animals can be both beneficial and, in some cases, detrimental, to the well-being of that animal and their human. While numerous studies have examined the benefits of the human-animal bond to humans, few investigations have been performed on the benefits or their lack thereof to the animals. In addition, studies investigating the early life histories and husbandry of animals on future behaviors such as forming beneficial bonds with humans are also sparse. Similarly, studies or review papers examining unhealthy or dysfunctional relationships between humans and companion animals are also encouraged.
