This Special Issue of Arts is interested in arts academics' experience of employer codes around other animals on and off the campus, including the following: the organisation's attitudes and inclinations and how these might collide or coincide with art's expectations; the hospitality on offer in the building to other animals; the risk assessments and administrative concessions; the refusals, red lines, and taboos; how clashes in ethics and culture wars about animals inform institutional policy; and how other animals relate in the material world to the human artist (student or teacher) who works. researches, and studies within the built environment of the academy itself. We call for essays on how the nonhuman animal enters the academy, focusing on the creative arts studio environment, to offer examples of ethical interventions in which the animal becomes a welcome partner in the making of creative coursework and its exhibition, performance, or publication.
