Message from the Guest Editor

From the early days of the pandemic it became apparent that boredom-both the in-the-moment feeling state and the trait disposition-played an important role in everyday experiences. Now, almost two years into the pandemic, we have a chance to examine the influence of state and trait boredom during this unprecedented time. How has boredom affected mental health? Has our move to a greater reliance on online communication and interaction been affected by boredom? What effect has boredom had on compliance with the restrictions imposed by lockdowns? There is also a unique opportunity to explore possible cross-cultural differences in the expression of boredom in these times. In the past, people may have taken boredom for granted as just a "part of the furniture of life". What the unique and extraordinary circumstances of the pandemic have shown us is that boredom is far from trivial. It is a selfregulatory signal that demands our attention to foster adaptive responses that were harder to engage during this pandemic.
