More than 40% of world energy consumption, and one-third of global carbon emissions, are produced in the construction sector. Furthermore, it is estimated that energy consumption in buildings can increase around 50% by 2050 due to the rapid growth in population and energy demand in emerging countries. Taking into account that the architectural design has a decisive impact on the energy demand of buildings during all their lifetime, this Special Issue is focused on cutting-edge research and technologies addressing climate-responsive design, based on the interaction between the indoor and outdoor environments. The main goal is to reduce the energy demand and carbon emissions in buildings, as well as increase the environmental comfort of the users.
