Genomic profiling has played a significant role in the rapid progress in our understanding of how cancers develop and progress, and contribute to precision in clinical care. However, the complexity and heterogeneity of cancer requires genomic profiling to be conducted along a number of orthogonal dimensions: single-cell to bulk tissue, model systems to human tissues, pediatric cancers to adult cancers, SNV to epigenetic to RNA profiling, etc. Such complex studies require an in-depth understanding of the opportunities and challenges of the complex heterogeneous data, developing associated analysis methods, and appropriate application of these methods to decipher the complexity of cancers. The journal *Cancers* invites articles in these broad areas of research for its Special Issue entitled “Genome Informatics in Cancers.” The articles may include original research, reviews, and perspectives on algorithms, statistical methods, software, and databases in all areas of cancer genomics (e.g., genomes, epigenomes, transcriptomes, regulomes, proteomes, and metabolomes).
