Motor Neuron Diseases: From Molecular Basic Research to Diagnosis and Therapeutics Implications

Message from the Guest Editors

Motor neuron diseases are a heterogeneous group of disorders that are implicated in the relentless degeneration of the motor system, leading to upper and lower motor neuron excitotoxicity, muscle atrophy, paralysis and finally death. Despite intensive molecular and clinical research, their etiology remains largely unclear. Several mechanisms common to motor neuron disorders have been identified; these include excitotoxicity; abnormal intracellular and mitochondrial metabolism caused by the accumulation of oxidative species; a disturbed protein quality control system caused by the accumulation of misfolded proteins, RNA toxicity, or translational byproducts; dysfunctional autophagic machinery; and secondary As advances are made in understanding critical aspects of the underlying molecular pathophysiology, therapeutic strategies continue to evolve. In this Special Issue, we aim to collect new findings addressing the etiology and diagnosis of motor neuron diseases, including the search for neuroprotective compounds and reliable biomarkers. Contributions related to motor neuron diseases are welcome, including original research articles and reviews.
