Gaining a better understanding of biological, social, psychological, and environmental factors that increase vulnerability to mental health problems and that promote resilience is critical to informing more targeted prevention and intervention efforts for children and adolescents. Therefore, this Special Issue's aim is to highlight innovative research that advances our knowledge regarding the influence of risk and resilience factors on the effects of childhood adversity on mental health during the developmental periods of childhood and adolescence.

We are particularly interested in publishing a collection of research papers that consider biological, social, psychological, and environmental risk and resilience factors, and encourage submissions from various disciplines and interdisciplinary teams (e.g., psychology, public health, psychiatry).
