# Message from the Guest Editor

The use of academic skills pervades daily life in adulthood, whether it is understanding medication instructions, engaging on digital platforms, helping children with their homework, detecting misinformation, or comparing the costs of food items. Nevertheless, many adults lack the foundational academic skills needed to adequately perform such daily life tasks. In this Special Issue, therefore, we invite researchers to share their scholarship in all aspects of adult literacy across diverse contexts, cultures, and modalities. Adults are defined as those 15 years of age or older, and for the purposes of this Special Issue, we are concerned with adults who have difficulties with foundational academic skills in particular. If they are of high school age, the focus must only be on those not enrolled in high school (i.e., they dropped out of high school). Settings can be in any country of the world, with a focus on academic skills (reading, writing, numeracy, and vocabulary). Studies exploring interventions, testing, learner or teacher characteristics, and professional development are encouraged. Practical implications and recommendations are required in all manuscripts.
