Understanding School Success of Migrant Students: An International Perspective

The aim of the Special Issue is to empirically identify and compare pathways for policy actions in schools and communities to tackle barriers of migrant students' school success. These resilience pathways will address differences in individual and social risks and identify protective factors for young immigrants to overcome obstacles linked to discrimination and low educational outcomes. The Special Issue focusses especially on international empirical research comparing and explaining school success factors for migrant students in different countries. Interestingly, international research so far has not conclusively identified if migrant students have special or even specific school success patterns, diverging from school success styles of native students.
