Message from the Guest Editors

The purpose of this Special Issue is to examine challenges affecting areas in the city and countryside that have concentrated populations of a particular ethnic background. Articles in this Special Issue are divided into two main groups, the first focusing essentially on ethnic communities in rural areas, while the second group of papers is focusing on the ethnic enclaves located in urban regions. The papers clustered in these two groups are expected to illustrate the role of globalization and political change in the transformation and resurgence of communities where ethnic minorities have placed their imprint on the landscape. The scope of this Special Issue is to document the main ideas pertinent to migration and diaspora, historical and colonial trauma, ethnicity, nationality and citizenship, nationalism, national identity, indigenous communities, ethnic neighborhoods around the world, and local heritage studies (e.g., heritage events, carnivals, exhibitions of local artefacts, local and community museums, local archives, etc.).
