Dear colleagues, Single cell RNA-sequencing (scRNA-seq) provides a unique opportunity to study inter-molecular relationships. Besides, scRNA-seq provides the opportunity to study allele-specific expression at an unprecedented resolution. We invite submissions of both methodological and original research papers assessing genetic variation, splicing and post-transcriptional modifications from scRNA-seq, and, where possible, their integration with gene and transcript expression. Topics may include, but are not limited to, studies of expressed genetic variation, including single nucleotide variants (SNVs), splicing and posttranscriptional modifications such as RNA-editing. The overarching aim of this issue is to stimulate the emerging and promising research on single cell transcriptomics, pursuing at the same time new exploratory and collaborative venues to address its challenges.
