Job burnout is a syndrome conceptualized as resulting from chronic workplace stress that has not been successfully managed (WHO, 2019). The feeling of exhaustion or energy depletion is considered the "core dimension" of this syndrome.

For this Special Issue of *IJERPH*, we invite authors to submit quantitative, qualitative, or mixed-method studies or literature reviews (e.g., meta-analysis, systematic review) that may advance the body of knowledge on the topic of burnout. Examples of research topics include, but are not limited to, the following areas:

- Psychosocial risk factors for burnout in relation to specific new and emerging issues (e.g., aging, job demands intensification, job insecurity, workplace violence, work-life balance, the pandemic covid-19);
- The roles of socio-demographic, personal, health-, and work-related factors in the development of burnout:
- The identification of mediators and or moderators in the relationship between work-related psychosocial factors and burnout;
- The prevalence of burnout among specific occupations and work settings.
