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Message from the Guest Editor

Homelessness and housing insecurity have peaked globally in the past decade. Many communities worldwide are affected by economic crises, natural disasters, and poverty and discrimination, which are often the root causes of homelessness. The opioid use crisis and lack of supportive systems and policies for mental health disabilities have led to millions living on the street, especially in large metropolitan cities such as in the United States.

Homelessness is not a new condition, but issues such as opioid overdose, skyrocketing housing prices, and unemployment resulting from COVID-19 have recently exacerbated it. Substance use and mental health instability can lead to homelessness, but homelessness also creates new trauma and drug addiction. Interventions within public spaces such as libraries for those unstably housed or low barrier access to medications for opioid use disorder are some strategies undergoing evaluation.
