Over the past four decades, advances in biomedical treatment of HIV have shifted HIV from a terminal diagnosis to a livable and treatable chronic illness, allowing people living with HIV to live fuller, healthier lives. In spite of these achievements, there are racial, ethnic, gender, and geographic disparities in healthcare access, HIV care engagement, medication adherence, viral suppression, and quality of life. Biobehavioral, community, and structural interventions and strategies are needed to achieve equity in HIV care outcomes and quality of life, particularly among the most marginalized members of society.
