The burden of mental disorders continues to grow (WHO, 2019) and may be increasing as a result of the pandemic. No single definition of mental disorder or health is widely accepted. WHO (2011) defines mental health as "a state of well-being in which every individual realizes his or her own potential, can cope with the normal stresses of life, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to her or his community."
