Message from the Guest Editor

Over the past two decades, significant advances have been made in the management of rheumatoid arthritis (RA). Early diagnosis, the prompt initiation of pharmaceutical therapies, and the application of a treat-to-target strategy with tight disease control have greatly improved the long-term outcomes of patients with RA.
