Message from the Guest Editors

Parkinson disease (PD) is the second most frequent neurodegenerative disease after Alzheimer's disease. People living with PD present a wide variety of symptoms, including motor symptoms and nonmotor symptoms. As the disease progresses, the effect of the medication decreases over time (wearing off). leading to fluctuating and difficult-to-control symptoms and thus greatly worsening patients' quality of life. That patients often do not perceive the manifestations of the disease, and therefore cannot accurately report their time course, further complicates therapeutic adjustment. This Special Issue will include research on the early identification of the various symptoms of Parkinson's disease or their fluctuation via different means. Research on progression markers aiming to enhance the understanding of these symptoms is also welcome. We welcome papers aimed at improving the clinical control of patients by any means, including innovations in the care process and nonpharmacological therapies.
