Migraine is a polygenic, dysautonomic, and chronic neurological condition marked by a "lower threshold of neuronal hyper-excitability", known as "the migrainous brain", with distinctive periodicity. Migraine is divided into migraine with aura (MA) and migraine without aura (MO). There is no cure for migraines, but several acute and preventive treatments are available to help mitigate the symptoms. At present, some drugs are used clinically to reduce the frequency and severity of migraine attacks, such as Analgesics, Triptans, CGRP receptor antagonists, etc. Acupuncture and feverfew are alternative therapies to relieve migraines. Devices and surgery are options for those who show no improvement with medication. However, migraine treatment is often limited by insufficient therapy response, leading to the need for individually adjusted medication.
