Gynecological Cancers: Surgical Treatment and Novel Radiotherapy

Message from the Guest Editor

Recent decades have witnessed significant advancements in surgical techniques for the treatment of gynecological cancers, resulting in shorter hospital stays, less blood loss, and lower morbidity levels due to the minimally invasive approach. It is now known that the histological categories of some gynecological tumors do not accurately differentiate the clinical course and response to therapy. Currently, a molecular profile study is being carried out to improve the risk stratification and targeted therapy for endometrial cancer. Radiotherapy has an important place in the management of gynecological tumors, either as an upfront treatment or as an adjuvant in patients treated with surgery and harboring risk factors for locoregional relapse (e.g., endometrial cancer, early-stage cervical cancer, etc.). Surgery is the mainstay of the treatment of endometrial cancer. This Special Issue aims to collect original research studies and review articles that add to the current knowledge and showcase the potential future approaches of novel agents for gynecologic cancers.
