Subarachnoid hemorrhage (SAH), primarily caused by ruptured intracranial aneurysms, is a serious condition that causes severe disability primarily in young, productive adults. For decades, it has been treated with surgical arterial clipping or, more commonly, endovascular treatment. Cerebral vasospasm (CVS) is the most common complication after subarachnoid hemorrhage (SAH), and it is also an important cause of death and disability in SAH. Active prevention and treatment of CVS is the key to improving the prognosis of SAH. The purpose of this Special Issue is to provide an up-to-date overview of the clinical diagnosis, treatment, and management of subarachnoid hemorrhage. We seek original, high-quality research papers, as well as review articles, that address major research challenges and achievements on the topic.
