Risk Prediction for Gynecological Cancer

Message from the Guest Editor

Risk prediction for gynaecological cancer is crucial for the early prevention, timely diagnosis, and effective treatment of cervical, endometrial and tubo-ovarian cancers. These cancers pose significant health threats to women worldwide, and understanding risk factors and tools to achieve early diagnosis can help researchers to reduce their incidence and mortality rates. Cervical cancer risk prediction relies heavily on screening and vaccination. Human papillomavirus (HPV) is the primary cause, so regular pap smears and HPV testing are essential, and screening programs and new assessments should be incorporated in clinical practice worldwide. Endometrial cancer, primarily affecting postmenopausal women, is often linked to obesity, diabetes, hypertension, and hormonal imbalances. Ovarian cancer presents the greatest challenge due to its often-late diagnosis and subtle early symptoms. This Special Issue will highlight recent advances in the context of diagnosis, treatment, and the prediction of prognosis for these malignancies.
