Message from the Guest Editor

The therapeutic management of venous thromboembolic diseases has undergone substantial advancements in recent years, especially due to the introduction of direct oral anticoagulants and the development of novel therapeutic strategies. Nonetheless, several gray areas remain, and they need to be further explored. Of interest is the issue of treating subjects with high hemorrhagic risk, as are the cases of individuals who have low platelet count, reduced kidney function, older age, previous bleeding history, or hereditary hemorrhagic diseases. Of interest are also the novel inhibitors of coagulation factor XI, which are currently under investigations for the prevention and treatment of thromboembolic diseases. Early diagnosis and proper treatment are crucial in reducing the acute and chronic complications of thromboembolic diseases. Preventing and treating post-thrombotic syndrome, and thromboembolic pulmonary hypertension is also a topic that deserves attention and investigation. In this Special Issue, we encourage authors to submit papers on the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of venous thromboembolic diseases and their complications.
