# New Insights into Fertility Preservation in Female Benign Conditions

### Message from the Guest Editor

Fertility preservation is common in patients whose fertility is compromised due to health conditions or diseases. Usually, it is associated with malignant pathologies, but there are also many benign clinical situations requiring particular attention for fertility preservation. Among benign female genital diseases, endometriosis is largely debated in the literature, especially in ovarian endometriosis surgery, as premature ovarian failure can occur. Uterine fibroids and adenomyosis are frequently surgically managed in order to protect or restore fertility and, in some cases, alternative technologies are suggested, such as uterine artery embolization. Care must also be taken when dealing with young patients with Turner syndrome, in transgender patients, as well as in patient affected by autoimmune or benign hematological diseases. In this Special Issue, we aim to focus on fertility-sparing surgery for benign conditions frequently encountered in practice.
