Angiosperms are an important part of the marine ecosystem, including underwater flowering plants and also emergent and subemergent macrophytes that live in marine environments. They are an outstanding reservoir of structurally diverse bioactive compounds with potential use as food additives, nutraceuticals, and drugs. This issue aims to highlight different aspects of bioactive compounds found in aquatic plants living in sea environments, such as seagrasses and mangroves. Specifically, we are interested in new research identifying the chemical structure, bioactivity evaluation, and source and biosynthetic pathways of bioactive compounds. Additionally, considering recent advances in the application of the coupling of chromatographic and spectroscopic techniques for the analysis of extracts, as , I encourage the submission of research papers describing the phytochemical analysis based on chemical dereplication, finger-printing, metabolomic studies, and molecular networking. Comprehensive review papers that synthesize current knowledge on bioactive compounds and their applications from marine angiosperms are also welcome.

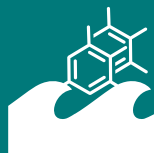

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


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About the Journal
