Message from the Guest Editor

The human gut flora is a highly diverse ecosystem of trillions of bacteria that live in our digestive tract and is often referred to as the microbiota or gut flora but is colloquially categorized into "good" or "bad" bacteria. When the balance between good and bad bacteria is "off balance," it is called a dysbiosis. Dysbiosis is associated with multiple systemic diseases. For example, an imbalance of intestinal flora can cause irritable bowel syndrome. Imbalances in the aut microbiota contribute to the development or progression of a range of rheumatic diseases: including rheumatoid arthritis. systemic lupus erythematosus, etc.; by affecting the balance between pro-inflammatory and antiinflammatory immune responses. Gut flora interacts bidirectionally with the nervous system via the flora-gutbrain axis. At present, the research on gut microbiota is still in its infancy, and there are relatively few studies on causality and mechanisms. This Special Issue welcomes original research articles and review articles related to recent discoveries concerning interactions between intestinal dysbiosis and diseases.
