Message from the Guest Editor

Materials are considered “smart” when they are “responsive” to stimuli ranging from internal biochemical cues to environmental factors (stress, temperature, humidity, pH, ionic strength, and specific chemical analytes) or to externally applied stimuli derived from magnetic or electric fields. These materials often exhibit dynamic and reversible changes in their critical physicochemical proprieties (e.g., their shape, volume, solubility, or molecular conformation), which can be repeated many times. Novel biomaterials with enhanced performance and unique properties are required in fields such as tissue engineering, immunoengineering, cancer research, immunomodulation, drug delivery systems, and antimicrobial materials. A material’s smartness is more important if the system is highly biocompatible and has poor toxicity, and thus, depends on the physico-chemical properties of the system. This Special Issue represents an opportunity for researchers in fields ranging from material science to biomolecular design, engineering, and medical physics to combine different aspects of their work.
