Over the last decade, graphene and beyond graphene nanomaterials (TMDs, Xenes) have centralized the interest of the scientific community, due to the extraordinary physical, optical, thermal, and electrical properties, which are correlated with their 2D ultrathin atomic layer structure, large interlayer distance, ease of functionalization, as well as tunable bandgap. Therefore, potential applications in the fastest growing fields of energy (photovoltaics, energy storage, fuel cells, hydrogen storage, catalysis, etc.), electronics, photonics, spintronics and sensing have been developed.
