Message from the Guest Editor

Obesity and its associated metabolic disorders represent a growing global health crisis with multifactorial origins that extend beyond simple caloric imbalance and poor dietary patterns. Recent evidence implicates contaminants ingested through food-both well established and emerging—as critical modulators of metabolic homeostasis, contributing to insulin resistance, adipose tissue dysfunction, inflammation, and dyslipidemia. This Special Issue of Nutrients will bridge fundamental mechanistic insights and translational prevention strategies by exploring how dietary exposure to persistent organic pollutants, heavy metals, mycotoxins, endocrine-disrupting chemicals, microplastics, and other unregulated foodborne toxins contributes to obesity-related pathologies. We welcome submissions-original research, reviews, and perspectives—that elucidate how contaminants consumed through food disrupt metabolic and cognitive functions, as well as approaches to their detection, dietary exposure assessment, and mitigation.
