## Message from the Guest Editors

Over the past two years, the COVID-19 pandemic has dramatically highlighted the correlation between travel and infectious diseases. International travel is a constantly growing and widespread phenomenon, as are migrations from endemic countries for neglected and tropical diseases, which can be imported and in some cases even established in non-endemic countries. Currently, few epidemiological data are available on imported diseases, which is probably also the consequence of a public health strategy that is not optimal for those at risk (travelers and migrants). Other possible reasons are the lack of knowledge of these diseases in clinical practice and the limited availability of diagnostic tools. In addition, there is a lack of data on the effectiveness of public health strategies for screening and linkage-to-care, particularly for chronic infectious diseases affecting migrants and long-term travelers. In this Special Issue of *Pathogens*, we invite you to submit your contributions on any aspect related to epidemiology, clinical manifestation, diagnostics, management and public health interventions for travelers or immigrants with infectious and/or tropical diseases.
