In parallel, millions of small chemical inhibitors have been screened through cell-based or target-based assays. Several breakthroughs have been made to screen antimalarials beyond the erythrocytic stage, such as in the liver stage. These advances in basic research and drug development are very exciting. In light of these new developments, *Pathogens* is launching a Special Issue devoted to “Advances in Novel Antimalarials”, which will cover several aspects of antimalarial drug development in the last two decades or so, including but not limited to:

- Novel antimalarial drug targets;
- Antimalarials that mainly cure clinical symptoms;

- Antimalarials for prophylaxis (liver stage);
- Mechanisms of antimalarial drug resistance.
