Since their discovery by Nocard in 1889, they have been implicated in diseases in humans, plants, and animals, as well as possessing environmental pollutant degrading properties. In humans, disease-causing species are mostly *Nocardia asteroides*, *N. brasiliensis*, and *N. caviae*. Nocardiosis is one of the pulmonary diseases caused by nocardiae such as *N. asteroides*, *N. farcinica*, and *N. nova*, whereas Mycetomas and sporotrichoid nocardiosis are mostly caused by *N. brasiliensis*.
