Nanosuspensions for the Improvement of Drug Bioavailability, 2nd Edition

Message from the Guest Editors

The majority of new chemical entities in discovery and development, and a number of approved compounds listed in classes II and IV of the Biopharmaceutical Classification System, are characterized by poor water solubility. Low solubility often results in limited or erratic bioavailability, which might impose higher doses to achieve a pharmacological effect, increasing the risk of toxicity and the waste of material. In the last several decades, nanocrystals have delivered the promise of increasing drug solubility and improving bioavailability. Nanocrystals can be dispersed in aqueous or nonaqueous media to produce nanosuspensions. Nanosuspensions, in addition to allowing high drug concentrations, have proved to be efficient in crossing numerous biological barriers. This Special Issue will include original research and thematic reviews on any aspects related to the development of nanosuspensions. Specifically, we welcome contributions focused on production processes and characterization methods, on the development of novel nanosuspensions, and on their assay in relevant in vitro/in vivo models.
