Since his life cannot be separated from the line of prophets, prophetic stories, and the central debates around prophethood (*nubuwwah*), articles pertaining to these areas are also welcomed. It is worth mentioning that reading *sīrah* through the lens of Islamic theology was one of the core arguments for neo-*kalam* movements in Islamic modernism. Thus, theology-related articles that will contribute, enrich, and clarify the discussion of the future of these genres will also be considered for inclusion.
