Due to the emissions of facilities and vast amounts of transport, various air pollutants and greenhouse gases (GHGs) are inevitably highly concentrated in cities. Remote sensing is an effective approach to provide spatial distribution information of atmospheric constituents. In recent years, atmospheric remotesensing technologies have been rapidly improved. Various remote-sensing techniques from ground-based or airborne platforms to satellite can be effectively applied to aerosol and gas measurements over cities and nearby areas.
