Precarious employment comprises a substantial social determinant of health inequities, with public health repercussions. Migrant workers are at a higher risk of exploitative and hazardous work conditions and health problems due to their precarious employment, immigration status and socio-economic marginalization. The Special Issue invites original theoretical or research articles focusing on the nexus of migration, international labour migration and health policy, to critically examine the health status of migrant workers.
