Substance Use and Child Welfare: Intersecting Crises

Message from the Guest Editors

Alcohol and other substance misuse is a significant factor in the majority of child welfare cases, contributing to a cascade of challenges related to safety, stability, and well-being. The intersections of these challenges present critical public health issues, demanding comprehensive, coordinated responses that extend beyond surveillance and removal to include prevention, treatment, and long-term recovery support. Families impacted by substance use often face fragmented systems of care, with limited access to timely, evidencebased interventions. This Special Issue invites empirical and theoretical contributions that explore innovative strategies for supporting families at the intersection of substance use and child welfare. We encourage research focused on models that span the full continuum—from prevention and early identification to treatment and sustained recovery. Topics of interest include integrated care delivery, family-centered practice, trauma-informed approaches, recovery housing, workforce training, and policy innovations that reduce barriers to treatment, support recovery, and promote lasting family well-being.
