Message from the Guest Editor

Dear colleagues,
Nowadays, a concept of the nonlinear complexity theory is recognized to govern a variety of dynamic behaviors observed in both natural and social sciences. In the 'non-equilibrium (or out-of-equilibrium) complexity system', symmetry-breaking occurs easily in concert with a phase transition of a chaotic or dissipative state to another one. In other words, fluctuation in a non-equilibrium state induces a phase transition to trigger the symmetry-breaking, and eventually the nonlinear amplification of fluctuation leads to dissymmetric circumstances. This Special Issue is devoted to investigations on the various chemical phenomena which originate from the symmetry-breaking induced by a phase transition in the condensed phases such as metastable crystals, liquid crystals, amorphous solids and polymer materials under non-equilibrium conditions, including other mysterious or strange chemical phenomena which need the elucidation of mechanism in the near future and theoretical calculations such as determination of anisotropic organic crystal structures by computer simulations using various algorithm, etc.
