Message from the Guest Editor

Research on the prevention and treatment of several chronic diseases is constantly growing worldwide. In recent years, there has been a rapid increase in the design and development of new drugs for human and animal use. In order to ensure the highest standards of treatment, in vitro cytotoxic assays and in vivo toxicological studies are required to ensure the safety of a drug formulation. The chronic use of drugs with immunosuppressive and cytotoxic effects may break down organs such as kidneys, stomach, liver, and intestines, causing side effects that are sometimes lifethreatening. Furthermore, antineoplastic drugs (known for their cytotoxic activity) from different sources and with different mechanisms of action are commonly used in large doses. This Special Issue aims to cover the current research in human and veterinary medicine focused on the cytotoxicity of drugs, and expects to receive contributions describing the recent advances and technological challenges encountered in new approaches to reduce adverse side effects of such drugs. Research and review papers on the safe use of drugs, and the potential risk of side effects in humans and animals, are also welcome.
