Advances in Research for the Potential Use of Plant Toxins

Message from the Guest Editor

As well known, a lot of seed compounds for the drug development were found from natural products such as plants, animals, microorganisms, minerals, and so on. The materials are sometimes listed in toxins and venoms. In old times, toxic alkaloid d-tubocurarine was isolated from *Chondodendron tomentosum*, and have been used as drugs and/or reagent for muscle relaxant. In other cases, tropane alkaloids, such as the hyoscyamine (levo-atropine) and scoporamine included in some Solanaceae plants, are very important antagonists for acetycholine receptor. In this way, natural toxins are very important drug seeds for critical effects. However, a lot of reported compounds with cytotoxicity were not examined satisfactorily for other beneficial use, except for anti-tumor drugs. The aim of this Special Issue is not limited to either plant toxins or toxic plants. Additionally, papers considering research topics, such as chemical structures, biological activity, data science (in vivo or in vitro), chemical biology, mechanisms, cultivation, etc., are welcome.
