Snake Bite: Prevention, Diagnosis and Treatment

Message from the Guest Editors

Snakebite envenoming, causing 100,000 deaths and 400,000 injuries annually, is a critical neglected tropical disease. Its multifaceted nature demands tailored interventions, yet controlled studies confirming their efficacy are lacking. Diagnosis relies on clinical assessment, with lab tests aiding in monitoring and species identification. Antivenoms are crucial for treatment, tailored to local snake populations. Supportive medical care is vital, alongside management of physical and mental aftermath. Despite a rich pipeline of novel approaches, further research is needed for translation. The Special Issue invites submissions on prevention, diagnosis, and treatment interventions, including social science and operational research, epidemiological surveys, program descriptions, and clinical studies on conventional and investigational products. Reviews are also encouraged.
