Clean water is the key to public health. In many countries around the world, there is no access to clean drinking water and no wastewater treatment is carried out, which leads to the pollution of natural water bodies. Therefore, proposals for highly effective and inexpensive methods of natural and wastewater purification are very relevant. At the present stage, there is a huge number of methods available for the purification of waste and natural waters. However, unfortunately, the problem of water purification has not been fully resolved. Modern methods of purification include the use of various sorption materials (nanostructures, sorbents from waste, biosorbents, plant sorbents, etc.), membrane technologies (ultra- and mesofiltration, reverse osmosis, etc.), phylomediation technologies using higher aquatic plants (Eichhornia, duckweed, limnophila, etc.) and much more.
